BILLIARDS.

For years past the formation of an amateur billiard association has been mooted in Adelaide. The movement was really advanced last winter, when Tattersall's Club sent Angelo Demodena to Melbourne to play for the Australian championship. Angelo did credit to the State, and it is sufficiently obvious that he, or a better man if one be available, should play for the championship this year at Brisbane. It will, however, be necessary if South Australia is to be represented to have an amateur association here, which will conduct a State championship tournament, the winner of which will be sent by the association to play for the Commonwealth championship.

On Wednesday a preliminary meeting of persons interested in the formation of an association was held at the Exchange liotel. Representatives were present from leading city clubs, and Mr. S. J. Jacobs presided. Mr. J. E. Barlow, the secretary of the Victorian Amateur Billiard Association, was present, and outlined the advantages of forming a local association. It was decided to convene a meeting to establish an association, and it will be held probably to-morrow fortnight.

There can be no doubt that an association is desirable. It will stimulate interest in billiards, by promoting a champion-ship tournament annually, and it may be reasonably expected that in its turn Adelaide will be made the venue for the Australian championship tournament. The association will be affiliated with the controlling billiard body of the world, the Billiard Association of Great Britain and Ireland.

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Today the retirement from his position of president of the Amateur Billiards Association of South Australia was announced by Mr. S. J. Jacobs. Mr. Jacobs has occupied this position since, in conjunction with Mr. Clarence Moody, he founded the association more than 20 years ago. Mr. Jacobs has rendered invaluable service to the sport. In the realm of South Australian commerce no man has attained higher altitudes than Mr. Samuel Joshua Jacobs, chairman of directors of the South Australian Brewing Company, Limited.

Business acumen and straightforward dealing have combined to make him one of the most popular leaders in commerce and sport that this State has had.

His wise counsel and guiding hand have piloted more than one venture to success.

No greater honor could have been paid him than his elevation to the presidential chair of the Associated Chambers of Commerce of the Commonwealth—the blue ribbon of commercial success.

So numerous are his activities that Mr. Jacobs would need to take up much time to recount the various positions he holds.

He is a son of the late Mr. Charles Jacobs, founder of the firm of Charles Jacobs & Sons, who arrived in South Australia in the early forties. Mr. S. J. Jacobs has taken a keen interest in the advancement of commercial education in this State. He took an active part in the establishment of the commercial course at Adelaide University.

For many years he occupied a seat on the council of the University of Adelaide, and was a vice-president at that institution of the Board of Commercial Studies.

Studied Law

The early educational studies of Mr. Jacobs were pursued at Adelaide under the direction of Mr. J. L. Young. In 1871 he went to Geelong College, Victoria, and subsequently matriculated at Melbourne University. He then entered upon the study of the law, and five years later, having served his articles with a Melbourne firm of solicitors, was called to the Victorian Bar.

Returning to Adelaide in 1876 he was admitted to practise at the Bar of the Supreme Court of South Australia, and was continuously engaged in his profession until 1884, when he became associated

with the firm of his father.

There are few more popular sportsmen in South Australia today than Mr. Jacobs. For 21 years he has been president of the South Australian Bowling Association, and is still active in spite of the fact that

he is 73 years of age.

Born in this State, Mr. Jacobs has devoted much time to fostering sport, but never to the detriment of his business affairs. In addition to his position on the directorate of the South Australian Brewing Company he is chairman of directors of the Castle Salt Company, another industry that he has been associated with since its beginning.

Thirty-five Years on Council

For 35 years he has been on the council of the Chamber of Commerce. He is also a member of the State Advisory Council.

Included in his activities are the positions of chairman of directors of Timore up-to-date methods, and has one of the Estates. and of the board of the Great Boulder ing Company. as well as man of the local board of the Sun Fire The Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals invoked his aid. president and chairman.
